Here are some of the things RAWA would do:

- Provide an additional \$15.6 billion in funding for workforce programs, including the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA), and the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education (CTE)
- Expands eligibility for WIOA to include new recipients of unemployment insurance through the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) program
- Modernizes the Trade Adjustment Assistance Community College and Career Training (TAACCCT) grant program
