## Livestream: There's more than one future of work

Technology associated with the Future of Work will impact workers in every sector and at every level in the U.S. economy – but those impacts will not be borne equally. Research indicates the majority of job losses from automation will be borne by workers earning less than \$20 / hour with a high school degree or less; many of these will be workers of color. Mid- and late-career workers with less developed digital skills than their younger counterparts are likewise vulnerable, as are a range of other experienced workers if they're at a workplace that is not willing or able to continually invest in their re-skilling.

The first discussion, [Uneven Prospects for Different Workers](#) will focus on how public policy should respond to the impacts felt by these different groups of working Americans. This session will feature panelists from NSC, AFL-CIO, the Joint Center for Economic and Political Studies, and AARP.
